Hello Climate Leaders. Two items to mention to you today.

First, a reminder to get me your travel information if you have not already done so, in order that I can confirm you in the room block and plan the logistics for those who need transportation to and from the airports. I will need all these confirmations no later than a week from tomorrow, August 5. Another reminder: If you are thinking of returning on Wednesday night September 14, that you will need an air reservation probably no earlier than 8:00 p.m., in order for there to be adequate time to get you back to the airport. If those are not available, you may want to plan on staying over Wednesday night and flying out on Thursday.

Second, a news flash: This morning, the U.N. General Assembly voted 161 For/0 Against/with 8 Abstentions to recognize a human right to a clean, healthy, and sustainable environment. The United States, FYI, voted in favor.

General Assembly resolutions are not legally binding, of course, but this one is at least indicative of a broad international consensus that environmental conditions can profoundly affect the ability of people everywhere to enjoy their pre-existing fundamental human rights and live with dignity.

Greetings, Judicial Leaders in Climate Science, from The National Judicial College! It was wonderful to see so many of your faces on the June 24 webinar. I hope you enjoyed it.

As the date for our September in-person session is on the horizon, I want to share some important information and reminders with you.

But first, please join me in congratulating and extending best wishes to our friend and classmate **Stacy Boulware-Eurie**, who earlier this month was nominated by the Governor to serve as an Associate Justice of California's Third District Court of Appeal. According to the press release, the position requires confirmation by the Commission on Judicial Appointments, which consists of Chief Justice Tani Cantil-Sakauye, Attorney General Rob Bonta and Senior Acting Presiding Justice Ronald Robie (who, as it happens, is a pioneer in California environmental jurisprudence).

Now for the logistical information on the September session, so you can begin to make your travel arrangements:

Dates – The dates for the course sessions are **Monday September 12 through Wednesday September 14, 2022**. You should therefore plan to arrive by ***Sunday evening, September 11***.

Lodging - Accommodations will be at the HOLIDAY INN, FALMOUTH, located at 291 Jones Road, Falmouth, Massachusetts, about half a mile from Falmouth Hospital. NJC has block-booked rooms. We will add your name to the room block once you have advised us of your

confirmed travel reservations. **PLEASE NOTE: THE HOTEL IS HOLDING THE ROOM BLOCK OPEN ONLY UNTIL AUGUST 11, 2022. IF WE DO NOT HAVE YOUR TRAVEL CONFIRMATION BY THEN, WE CANNOT GUARANTEE THAT A HOTEL ROOM WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR YOU.**

Closest Major Airports – The two closest major airports are:

- **Logan Airport** in Boston, Massachusetts, and
- **T.F. Green Airport** in Providence, Rhode Island.

You should book your flight reservations, which you can either do on your own (and subsequently submitting reimbursement requests) or by using the National Judicial College's travel agent, Becky Rose, at (775) 324-1777 or brose@btttravel.com. **N.B. If you are thinking of booking your return flight on Wednesday night following the end of the session, please be aware that you will only be able to make a night flight, as it will take approximately two (2) hours to travel by motor vehicle to either airport.**

Airport Transport – Please review the following information carefully.

For those who do NOT need transportation to and from the airport: If you are planning on staying on past the end of the conference to enjoy Cape Cod in glorious late summer weather and/or decide to rent your own car (or make your own personal alternative travel arrangements) at Logan or T.F. Green, please let me know, so I don't include you in the group transport arrangements. Please note that we will not be reimbursing the cost of such private transportation arrangements from Logan or T.F. Green, but if you drive yourself we will reimburse at the NJC's per mile rate for the distance between the airport and the hotel. Similarly, for those of you living within driving distance of Cape Cod who plan to drive to Falmouth rather than subject yourself to the vagaries of air travel, we will reimburse your mileage to and from your point of origin at NJC's per mile rate.

For those who DO need transportation to and from the airport: If you need transport to and from Logan or T.F. Green, we will be making arrangements for SUV or van

transportation from the airports Sunday afternoon/evening to the hotel and back to the airports on either Wednesday night or Thursday.

IMPORTANT: In order efficiently and cost-effectively to make these travel arrangements, we will need your flight information and arrival/departure times so that we can coordinate pickups for groups of people. So once you have made your flight reservations, please send me that information promptly.

Venue for Course Sessions – Course sessions will be held at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute and the Woodwell Climate Research Center. We are arranging van transportation between the course venues and the Holiday Inn each morning and evening.

Tuesday Group Dinner - I have made reservations for a group dinner Tuesday evening, September 13, at 7:00 p.m. at a lovely restaurant on Main Street in downtown Falmouth, *La Cucina Sul Mare*. We will be seated in a large outdoor tent the restaurant maintains. I personally checked out this venue and had a lovely meal. (Well, *someone* had to take one for the team!)

In a future e-mail, I will send along a special conference menu with your food choices for appetizers, entrées, and desserts that evening.

The restaurant is just under a mile from the Holiday Inn, so in good weather it's eminently walkable, but if it's raining we can arrange some combination of taxis, Ubers, and carpooling with the help of those with their own cars.

Dress Code - You can't go wrong with business casual. However, Cape Cod is used to summer vacationers, so please feel free to bring casual attire! Temperatures one week

after Labor Day should still be mild to warm (but historically not hot), and cool and breezy in the evenings. Of course, it's far too soon to predict Cape weather months in advance. You, as Climate Leaders, are certainly well aware of climate uncertainties! 😊 Please plan on checking the weather forecast for Falmouth, Massachusetts shortly before you start packing your suitcase for the trip.

Greetings Climate Leaders:

Hard as it is to believe, the long, hot summer is waning and September is already upon us. The National Judicial College (NJC) and the Environmental Law Institute's Climate Judiciary Project (ELI) are looking forward to welcoming you to our second, in-person session for this course on Cape Cod. The course sessions will be held at two locations at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution ("WHOI").


I am writing today to provide some general information about the sessions and some of the on-Cape logistics. It is possible that some of these arrangements might change, and if that happens we will notify everyone.

Airport Transport. Those of you who have asked for ground transportation from and to Boston's Logan Airport or Providence's T.F. Green airport will receive a separate e-mail from me detailing your pickup times and locations.

Hotel Accommodations. My NJC colleague, Erin O'Brien (the Course Administrator, whom most of you met at the Reno session in March), tells me that your reservations are all registered in the NJC room block at the Holiday Inn in Falmouth. Erin will be sending out the confirmation numbers in advance of the course. At check-in, please provide your name and mention that you are part of the National Judicial College room block.

Some of you have indicated that you will be driving to this session of the course. The Holiday Inn is located at 291 Jones Road, Falmouth, Massachusetts 02540. The telephone number is (508) 540-2000. If you are driving there yourself, you will of course be following your mobile GPS directions or consulting your road map, but I would recommend that you take the Bourne Bridge rather than the Sagamore Bridge as a more direct route to the hotel. Once over the Bourne Bridge onto Cape Cod, don't let the rotaries (Massachusetts lingo for a roundabout or a traffic circle) confuse you. Just stay on Rte. 28: It's a pretty straight shot from the Bourne Bridge, and then you'll make a left onto Jones Road and you're almost there!

Course Packets: NJC will be providing a hard copy folder containing an agenda, roster, and bios. All other material will be provided electronically and you will be given access instructions on Monday, September 12.



Group Meals:

Breakfasts, Lunches, and Refreshments are being arranged at the conference venues (WHOI and WCRC) by ELI.

ELI is also sponsoring a "Shore Dinner" on Monday evening, September 12, at the University of Chicago Marine Biological Lab. NJC has organized transportation (see below).

NJC has also arranged the Tuesday night, September 13 Group Dinner at *La Cucina sul Mare*, an Italian restaurant in downtown Falmouth. The event will commence at 7:00 p.m. The street address for *La Cucina sul Mare* is 237 Main Street, Falmouth, MA 02540, and the telephone number is (508) 548-5600. The restaurant is approximately 1 mile from the Holiday Inn, so in good weather those who want to walk can leave the hotel around 6:30 p.m. and walk to downtown Falmouth; should it rain, we will have to scramble for those with automobiles to give lifts to those without. (It's a very short drive, and there is street parking).

The dinner at La Cucina will have something of an outdoor feel to it, as it will be held in a tent, unless the weather is exceptionally bad, in which case we would eat indoors. I have attached a menu for our group dinner just for informational purposes: We needn't order in advance. I have selected wine to be served with dinner (one white and one red), and there will be a cash bar available as well.

I have also attached a PDF with walking directions from the hotel to La Cucina. According to the map software, it takes about 17 minutes.

Ground transportation to and from the Holiday Inn and Conference Venues:

We may ask one or more of you with cars to drive yourself (and perhaps give someone else a lift) to the conference venues. NJC has been able to arrange ground transportation with Falmouth Taxi for a maximum of 22 persons, which will be done in two shifts, as the maximum van capacity is 11 persons.

For those of you who are driving from the Holiday Inn to the conference venues, here are the relevant street addresses:

7:30 a.m. – 8:00 a.m. 22 passengers (maximum). Pickup at Holiday Inn, Falmouth, and drop-off at WHOI Redfield, 57 Water Street, Woods Hole, MA

5:30 p.m. – 6:00 p.m. 22 passengers (maximum). Pickup at 57 Water Street and return to Holiday Inn, Falmouth.

Wednesday September 14

7:30 a.m. – 8:00 a.m. 22 passengers (maximum). Pickup at Holiday Inn, Falmouth and drop-off at WHOI Quissett Campus, 360 Woods Hole Road.

3:30 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. 22 passengers (maximum). Pickup at WHOI Quissett Campus and return to Holiday Inn, Falmouth

Dear Judicial Leaders,

Two years ago, your Chief Justice nominated you to take part in the first Judicial Leaders in Climate Science group. Today, ELI and NJC have, again, initiated this process to assemble our second group of judicial leaders for the program. As we embark on this journey, we do so owing a debt of gratitude to you all for being the first ones to participate and exemplifying the potential for judicial leaders in climate science.

We intend to continue regular communication with you all, both directly and through this listserv, and offer you opportunities to engage with this new cohort of judges. Below you will find these opportunities and program updates:

JLCS 2024 Program

1. Your Chief Justice has received a letter from NJC requesting nominations for judges to participate in the second JLCS cohort. If you have recommendations of an interested and well-suited colleague, we encourage you to contact your Chief Justice.

January Group Call

1. Since the group last virtually gathered in June, much has happened. We invite you to join your colleagues and the ELI and NJC teams on a call in January to discuss the CJP curriculum and learn about a mentorship opportunity (detailed below). We will send call information separately.

Mentorship

1. Having had the opportunity to be the first participants of this program, you are uniquely qualified to mentor judges in the second cohort. You may be contacted to participate as a mentor depending upon factors, such as geography, jurisdiction, and more. If contacted, we will invite you to mentor participating judges from your state/territory or region. If you accept our invitation, we will connect you with your mentee(s) and ask that you have at least one conversation with them in 2024. You and your mentee can determine the frequency of future conversations. We will discuss this mentor program in January and welcome your thoughts and questions.

New Staff

1. The National Judicial College has appointed a new lead staffer for our program, Alf Brandt. Prior to joining NJC, Alf served the California State Assembly as an expert on environmental law and policy, particularly California water. Most recently, he served as General Counsel to Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon. Drawing on his expertise on water law, he has served all three branches of government and at the federal, state, and local levels. He has worked and volunteered with NJC, in its Dividing the Waters Program, since 2011.
2. Helene Krasnoff will join the Environmental Law Institute as the Director of the Climate Judiciary Project. Helene is a respected leader in the legal community who brings decades of program leadership, strategy development, and litigation experience. An expert in constitutional and administrative law, Helene has practiced before the Supreme Court, several federal circuits, and many state courts, focused on issues of science and law. ELI is excited to welcome Helene in mid-January.

Judicial Leaders in Climate Science

We are inviting you to nominate a judge from your state to participate in the 2024 educational program, *Judicial Leaders in Climate Science*. The program is designed especially for judges with experience or interest in climate litigation, in states where climate litigation is likely, as well as for judges more broadly with a role in judicial education.

Please respond no later than January 5, 2024. Send the name and email address of your nominee to Hon. Benes Z. Aldana, President, NJC at [REDACTED]. Please let us know why the person you are recommending is a good candidate for the program.

Commitment from Each Participant

To participate, each judge must commit to the following activities in 2024:

- (1) attend two, in-person educational programs:
 - a. March 11–14, 2024 at The National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada
 - b. September 16–18, 2024 at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute in Woods Hole, Massachusetts
- (2) participate in quarterly webinars to learn about specific climate science topics, share case law developments in their respective jurisdictions, share updates on state-specific activities. Dates to be determined (will be recorded).
- (3) participate in the evaluation of the curriculum
- (4) create and implement an action plan to apply the course curriculum to build the capacity of their state judiciary on managing cases involving climate science

Funding For Your Nominee

Your nominee will receive a scholarship which will cover the costs of the educational programming, plus travel expenses to attend the two, in-person courses. (The cost of a reasonable round-trip, coach, airfare is included as well as room and tax for lodging at the conference hotels for both events. After the program, participants may submit their receipts for ground transportation up to a maximum of \$100. During the in-person programs, breakfast and lunch will be provided, as well as one group dinner. Expenses that are not covered include ground transportation in excess of \$100, non-provided meals, and personal, incidental expenses.)

Additional Nominees?

If you would like to send a second representative, we will do our best to accommodate, but the scholarship funding is available for only one judge from each state. Second nominees will be responsible for paying their own travel expenses.

Need for the Program

One of the fastest-growing, intellectually stimulating, and potentially most significant trends in courts is the rise in litigation related to responsibility for, responses to, and planning for climate change. As you understand more than anyone, judges are crucial thought leaders not only in their courtrooms but also with their peers on the judiciary. The National Judicial College and the Environmental Law Institute's Climate Judiciary Project are hosting the second cohort of the ***Judicial Leaders in Climate Science*** to build capacity in state judiciaries to respond to this challenge. The program is a year-long curriculum of leadership training integrated with climate science topics generally relevant to climate-related cases.

In the United States, we are seeing significant crop and property damage due to changing weather patterns, increased heat, inland flooding, prolonged droughts and wildfires in the western states, and sea level at historic highs while reservoir levels are at historic lows. The National Academy of Sciences and other mainstream scientific bodies have attributed these impacts to climate change. Recent years have seen scores of judicial decisions by U.S. courts on climate-related issues, including:

- *Juliana v. United States*, 947 F.3d 1159 (9th Cir. 2020) dismissing on redressability grounds young plaintiffs' constitutional claims related to the federal government's role in fossil fuel permitting, authorization, and subsidization (still ongoing in federal district court in Oregon).
- *Held v. Montana* (Mont. 2023) finding Montana state law forbidding consideration of climate in environmental reviews violated state constitutional right to a "clean and healthful environment" (on appeal in Montana Supreme Court).
- *Connecticut v. Exxon Mobil Corp.*, No. 21-1446 (2d. Cr. Sept. 27, 2023) (2017) remanding to state court lawsuit alleging violation of state consumer protection laws for misleading and deceiving consumers about Exxon's products' climate impacts.
- *Environmental Defense Fund v. Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment*, No. 21CA2032 (Colo. Ct. App. Nov. 3, 2022) upholding state agency actions implementing 2019 state climate change legislation.
- *In the Matter of the Application of Hawaii Electric Light Co., Inc.*, No. 22-0000418 (Mar. 13, 2023) affirming Public Utilities Commission denial of power purchase agreement for biomass power plant.

This trend reflects the jurisprudential development of the many ways climate change will affect society and the courts and the need for an understanding of the underlying science.

In order to build capacity in state judiciaries to be prepared for the increasing numbers of state climate cases and the science that arises in them, ***Judicial Leaders in Climate Science*** will train judges in both leadership skills and content of accepted climate science. The objective of the program is to enable participants to take appropriate judicial leadership roles to improve the way cases involving climate science are managed and thus to build capacity in their states.

We look forward to welcoming many distinguished judges to this exciting program!


