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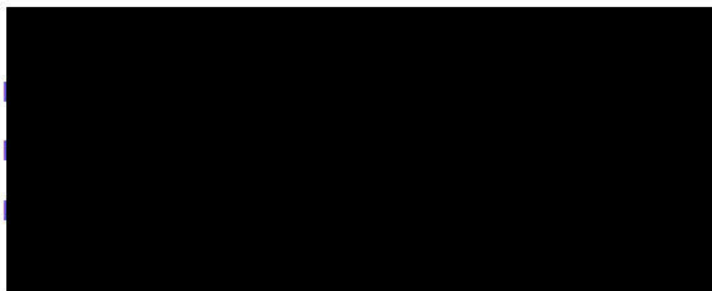

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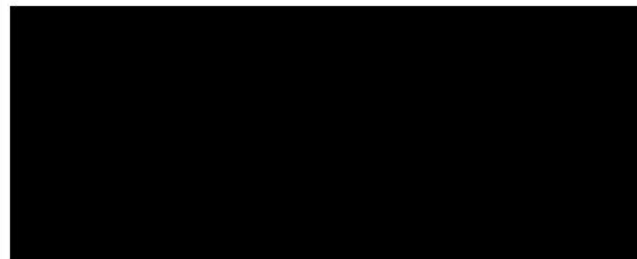

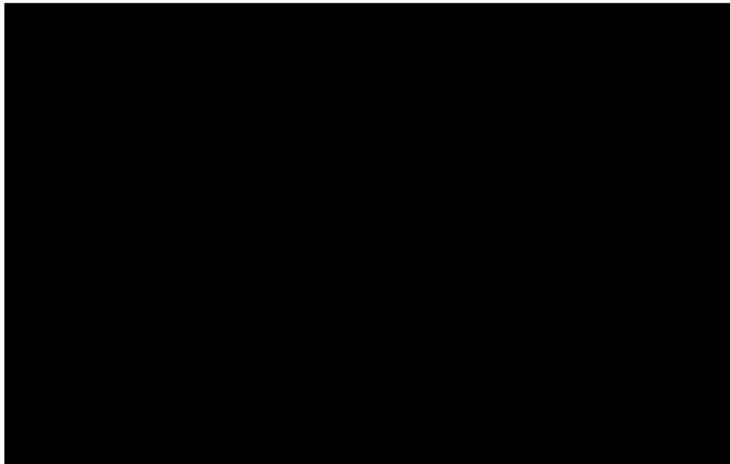

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The protection of Hawaii depends on environmental defenders all over the world who are rising to protect forests, the ocean, the air, the water. No other person on earth can be said to have made more of a sacrifice on behalf of the people of Hawaii than Edwin Chota.

For the law to protect those environmental defenders like Edwin Chota who are still alive...for the law to protect the earth and the culture Edwin Chota loved, the law must be applied by the men and women judges whose sworn duty is to follow, defend and uphold the law.

I am here to honor Edwin Chota and what he has done for Hawaii and to witness that the rule of law will protect his courage. Now those who took his life, who planned to silence him, are facing the rule of law. As long as they live, they will carry with them the knowledge that, if they are found out and brought before a court, the law will hold them accountable for the murder of the great environmental defender Edwin Chota.

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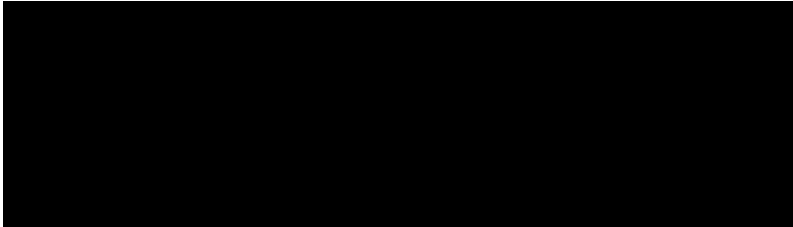
